APPLICATION SUBMISSION AND DEADLINES

- All information on this form must be completed, including all required documentation (e.g., referee reports).
- Once completed, upload your addendum to the "My Documents" section of your online application.
- Please do not submit any password-protected documents in the application process.
- Applicants may only apply and attend the selection process for a single campus.
- THE APPLICATION CLOSING DEADLINE IS 1 February 2026. It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that all documentation, including the online referee reports, are submitted by the referees directly to SACAP by the closing deadline.
- Incomplete and/or late applications will not be considered.
- Before applying, it is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that they can fund their studies. For information on fees or any other queries, please contact the admissions team:

SELECTION PROCESS

- STAGE 1: Applications are paper-screened, and candidates will be notified of the outcome.
- STAGE 2: Shortlisted candidates are invited to schedule an interview with the programme coordinator to determine suitability for the programme.
- The selection committee will deliberate, and final outcomes will be sent to candidates via email.

CERTIFICATION

- Students who are succeful in their application will be required to produce documentation
 required by the South African Council for Social Services Professions (SACSSP) for registration at
 the time of BSW registration or by the time they apply for SACSSP student registration, in
 accordance with the SACSSP's Policy on the Fit and Proper Person Requirement (2017). This
 includes:
 - o Police Clearance Certificate
 - o National Child Protection Register (Part B) clearance
 - o Children's Act 38 of 2005 (Form 30)
 - o Register of persons convicted of abuse of older persons (Older Persons Act 13 of 2006)
- The South African Council for Social Service Professions (SACSSP)'s Code of Ethics, as mandated by the Social Service Professions Act 110 of 1978 and the Policy on the Fit and Proper Person Requirement, provides guidelines on qualities that could indicate that a person is indeed a fit and proper person for the profession. One such guideline is that applicants presenting an unacceptable risk to the public should not be registered. Given this, please note that:
 - A mental health challenge does not disqualify you from entry into the social work education and training programme.





- However, SACAP has a professional, ethical and moral obligation to ensure that our students who enter the BSW programme are adequately trained and are fit and proper to practice their profession safely and ethically in line with the SACSSP Code of Ethics and related regulations.
- Therefore, all applicants are encouraged to disclose any diagnosed or undiagnosed mental health challenges. Disclosure is not compulsory, but it is encouraged for SACAP to provide appropriate supportive services during their training.
- If you are accepted into the BSW programme, please take note that:
 - SACAP reserves the right to make decisions on students' fitness and propriety to graduate and practice as a registered social worker. As such, SACAP also reserves the right to determine who is not fit for practice.
 - SACAP reserves the right to determine whether students are conducting themselves in line with the values and standards for professional conduct or if they are not fit for practice.
 - If concerns arise, interventions and support will be provided where necessary and appropriate.
 - All students accepted into the BSW programme will undergo a compulsory progress review at the end of every term.
 - If concerns arise regarding professional conduct, fitness, and propriety to practice within
 the social work professional scope, SACAP reserves the right to withhold certification until
 all requirements for certification have been satisfactorily fulfilled, subject to the existing
 qualification and registration maximum timeframes.


